THE NATIONAL EXECUTIVE REPORT

November '98 - February '00

After fifteen months on the National Executive and with National Conference upon us, the time has come to evaluate our performance since November 1998. I think we are all agreed that we came on the Exec. full of ideas, enthusiasm and expectation. We leave regretting that we could not do all the things we hoped to, but satisfied that we were a good National Executive with many achievements to our name.

The National Executive has, over the past fifteen months tried to reinvigorate Young Fine Gael as an organisation on the ground, raise our profile in the media, influence Fine Gael with our policies and ideas and get young candidates selected and elected for Fine Gael. We have given voice to a number of issues that other political organisations would rather avoid and ignore and we were true to the radical mandate that we were given at the 15th National Conference in Connemara in 1998.

During the period of office of this National Executive, Ireland has changed greatly. We have seen the consolidation of our economic success with the virtual elimination of unemployment and a reversal of a generation tide of emigration to real immigration for the first time in centuries, we have witnessed dramatic changes in Northern Ireland. We have also seen the "new world order" winning its first important battles in Kosovo and in Timor Lorosae, a land with which YFG has been concerned for so long.

However, Ireland has not become the "Just Society" that we envisaged in Connemara in 1998. Our economic growth has benefited all of us but has created

and exacerbated many of our country's greatest problems. The response of Irish people to refugees and immigration has turned our economic miracle sour. Young Fine Gael

must always be on guard to oppose the rise of Nationalism, whether it be in the war torn states of the former Yugoslavia, on the pristine mountain tops of the Austrian Alps or on our own streets and in our own towns and villages.

Social Exclusion has dominated our politics and media and yet no government or political party has really acted to eliminate exclusion and discrimination in our society. The very fabric of Irish society has been undermined by our drive towards individualism and the evaporation of faith in politics and our system of government. The derisory turnout in the local elections and in the Dublin south-central by-election should have set of alarm bells for those of us who have the power the change Ireland and the society in which we live. Yet, it has not. For these reasons, we have decided to make theme of the I 6th National Conference, "A New Ireland - Community and Economy."

A time when it is unfashionable, even embarrassing to be a member of a political party, Young Fine Gael can say with pride that we have increased our membership yet again and can point to a number of regions in which we have enhanced our presence. In our south-western strongholds we can point to consolidation and new growth particularly in Kerry. We have at last turned the corner in the Capital with UCD and Trinity soaring in size and activity and with new branches in the DIT and DCU. The success of the Dublin Regional Group which I had the pleasure to Chair provided a good example for other parts of the country. The DRG ran an excellent Dublin transport campaign over the Christmas period and oversaw regeneration in a

number of the Dublin constituencies. This is, I hope, just the beginning. In other areas, Tullamore, Meath and the WIT, real growth in numbers and activity has been recorded. In Donegal, thanks to hard work and innovation, Young Fine Gael at last has a strong arm in Ulster. We must note, however, that we did not do enough to arrest the decline in the West and the battle to get into IT's around the country continues. It is extraordinary that in a time of such youth apathy that political organisations are practically banned in many of these third level institutions. This has to be a priority for the new Executive. Moreover, we failed to get the Regional Forums up and running (except in Dublin) and did not work hard enough to keep branches active. This is probably the most important role an Executive member can have.

Nonetheless, Young Fine Gael was instrumental in so many of Fine Gael's local election campaigns, both in getting candidates selected and more importantly elected. The long list of young candidates elected on the 11th of June 1999 is impressive. Before the local elections, the average age of a Fine Gael councillor was 54. With the election of so many young candidates Fine Gael has a wealth of good Dail candidates in many areas.

We regret that more young candidates did not make it to the council chamber and that YFG could not do more for them.

The National Executive did well on PR over the course of its term in office. Although not quite a household name, I can honestly say that as PRO, rarely a fortnight has passed without Young Fine Gael making it into the national newspapers or on to the radio. Our hotly disputed, but brave decision, to take a stand on abortion in the early part of our term grabbed all the headlines and had me on one occasion standing in D'Olier Street at half past mid-night waiting for the first editions. We scored victory on the "Touts Out Campaign" which we inherited from our predecessors and scored a blinder on our poster campaign for the June '99 elections to encourage young voters to make Fine Gael their "first time". Who would have thought that you could use sex to sell our MEPs!! Thanks Joanne. Hey, at least the woman was on top! Our education campaign was launched with some success in

various local media. We really turned heads with our campaign on refugees and immigration. No, Minister O'Donoghue, we did not manipulate your photo!

The annual summer barbecue in June, and the Training Day in September '99 went off well. It was good to see faces from newly established branches present. The Waterford Seminar on suicide in January '99 was a real success and formed a valuable part of Fine Gael's regeneration strategy in the city. Suicide remained on the YFG agenda for the rest of the year with NUIG and Tullamore branches also running successful public meetings on the issue. The newly introduced Young Fine Gael "Summer School" in Carlingford, Co. Louth, during August '99, was perhaps one of the highlights in our programme of activity. Young Fine Gael members gathered from all over Ireland in the Carlingford Adventure Centre to develop our vision of what "A New Patriotism" meant to us. We all agreed that this should become an annual event for Young Fine Gael. A healthy balance of workshops, water sports and social interaction proved to be a winning formula.

On the policy front, Young Fine Gael did not restore itself to the political think tank that it once was. The National Policy Council and Policy Research Unit were not pursued. However, the Northern Ireland group restarted under Joe Duffy (Donegal South West). We can also point to some good policy work. Our Prison Reform document and Refugee/Immigration policy document were covered by the media and largely incorporated into party policy. Shane Morris (U.L)

deserves particular credit for his document on GM foods which earned us a lot of publicity and was taken by him to YEPP, where it was endorsed in almost its entirety.

The International Committee went from strength to strength. Stephen McCullen replaced Joanne Harmon as YEPP vice-president. It is a credit to the International Committee, our excellent record of representation on the YEPP Board and of course to the candidate that our seat was retained amid such stiff competition. The IC aimed to attract more members from outside of Dublin. This was achieved with regular mailings to all chairs and secretaries, meetings outside Dublin, open membership and an IC Website. A very good panel of YFG'ers has represented the organisation in Europe and with these diplomatic missions, the IC has found its policy-making zeal once more.

One of the real successes of this Executive has been the development of links with the Northern parties. The newly re-established Northern Ireland Policy Group under the stewardship of Joe Duffy co-operated with the Executive in a fact-finding mission to the North. With branches following suit, YFG has done more to

recognise the full implications of the changing circumstances in Northern Ireland than the senior party has. It is a fair criticism of this Executive, to say that we could have done more to get policy groups set-up and working. Policy Groups are not just about policy. They have an educational and public relations role. We need to be meeting more with young teachers, unions, NGOs and front-benchers to discuss policy issues.

The National Executive regained our second seat on the Executive Council on which we were represented by our President Patrick O'Donovan and Richard Hammond. We played an active part as individuals at the Ard Fheis but were unable to do more as an organisation. Valerie Duffy was re-elected to the board of NYCI. We also increased the frequency and quality of Futureline.

The purpose of this report, it to give you, the member, an insight into some of the events of the last year and a half from the point of view of the National Executive. As this National Executive's term of office come to a close an end, we would like to sincerely wish the incoming National Executive the very best.

YOUNG FINE GAEL: BUILDING ON OUR SUCCESS

It doesn't seem like fifteen months since we all gathered in Connemara for our last National Conference. The radical mandate that was handed to the Executive was to hit the headlines in many forms over the past year or so. Whether it was the government's handling of asylum seekers and immigrants, drugs issues or genetic modification, Young Fine Gael was a head of the game, in our views, in our public campaigns and our policies.

This year, there is still a need to be radical in our organisation. We are likely to face an election within eighteen months and we must be ready to face the electorate with a real alternative to government. It's not easy to do this in a time when apathy is rife, when economic times are good and social deprivation and marginalisation are brushed under the carpet. The concepts of social justice, of civil society, of the balance between uncontrolled growth and the quality of life, is just not on the government's agenda. John Bruton, our Party Leader, on the other hand has articulated the Fine Gael long-term view for the nation and Young Fine Gael has an important role in spreading this message.

The last year saw some of our young members standing for the Local Elections. It was heartening to see so many young people willing to contest conventions and put their names into such a public arena. It will stand the party in good stead in years to come and is a very hopeful sign for the future that young people still

believe that politics has the power to change society for the better.

On the organisational front, we have seen new areas of growth in YFG. New branches have been established in many quarters and we must ensure that they are sustained over the next year. The incoming Executive must see that the regional forums inserted into the constitution last year, happen quickly in order to provide an outlet for branches operating in isolation, between national events.

From National Office, we increased resources to branches to assist them in carrying out their business and training in new members. The Guide for New Members, The Branch Manual, poster backings, YFG flags, promotional leaflets and the History of the Party booklets have all been added to the substantial resource material available. New branches received advertising grants for their start-up meetings and third level branches received grants to assist with their activities. All national activities were heavily subsidised to facilitate members travelling and/or accommodation costs. I think we can safely say that the average YFG member gets good value for her £2!

Lastly, I would like to thank you the members, for the time and energy you have given as volunteers and to all those who have so often responded to my phone calls with such courtesy and agreed to go canvassing, leaflet dropping, envelope licking etc!! It is deeply appreciated. Thanks also to the parliamentary party for their support in attending YFG events. Finally a big thanks to my colleagues in Fine Gael National Office, the Press Office and Leader's Office for their on-going support and assistance.

Standing Orders

1. Procedure

The ruling of the presiding Chairperson on all matters is final.

2. Motions and Amendments

- (a) Only Motions and Amendments to the Constitution and Rules which are on the Programme may be moved, except for those Motions subject to Standing Order 8.
- (b) A Motion or Amendment may be moved only by the Unit of the Organisation listed on the Programme.

3. Quorum

Where less than 15% of registered delegates are not present, the meeting shall be inquorate and the Chairperson shall adjourn the session until the Conference becomes quorate. Only one quorum count may be called at each session of Conference by a member of the Conference Steering Committee.

4. Speakers

- (a) A strict time limit will be imposed on all Speakers in order to allow the Programme to be completed.
- (b) In general the proposer of a Motion or an Amendment will be allowed no more than 2 minutes.
- (c) All Speakers must report to the Speakers Desk 15 minutes before the start of a session. An absolute right to speak cannot be guaranteed.

5. Points of Order and Information

Delegates may speak from the floor on a point of order or information. Points of Order shall relate to the procedure adopted or to the conduct of the meeting. Points of information may be raised by any delegate who states that he/she is rising on such a point and such a delegate may be heard if the speaker gives consent. Points of order or information shall be limited to 15 seconds.

Amendments

- (a) Amendments shall be submitted to the Speakers desk before the start of each session.
- (b) Amendments must not contradict the spirit of the motion.
- (c) The proposer of a motion has a one minute right to reply in the event of an Amendment.
- (d) Amendments must be signed by either the Chairperson or the Secretary of at least two units of Young Fine Gael.

7. Relevancy

If any delegate is directed by the Chairperson to cease speaking on the grounds or irrelevancy, he/she must do so forthwith.

8. Emergency Motions

- (a) Emergency motions must only deal with events of exceptional significance which have occurred after February 3rd 2000.
- (b) Emergency motions must be submitted to the Steering Committee before 10.00pm on Friday February 25th 2000.
- (c) An emergency motion must be signed by the Chairperson or Secretary of two units of Young Fine Gael.
- (d) The decision of the National Conference Steering Committee is final.

9. Voting

- (a) The Chairperson shall appoint tellers for each session of the National Conference.
- (b) Voting shall be by a show of delegate cards.
- (c) The Chairperson shall rule on the need for a division.
- (d) Once a division is been called and ruled by the Chairperson, and a result declared, no further requests for counts shall be considered.
- (e) Voting on each motion shall take place directly after each motion has been debated.
- (f) In the case of Amendments, the National Conference must first vote on accepting the Amendment. If the Amendment is accepted, the motion as amended shall be put to the Conference. If the amended motion is passed, the original motion shall not be put to the Conference.

10. Standing Orders

Once Standing Orders have been accepted by the Conference, they cannot be suspended or amended.
