







Continuing the legacy of the founding fathers

Here are the highlights from the Taoiseachs speech delivered last year in Ennis to mark the 30th anniversary of the death of Eamon de Valera.

As we mark the 30th anniversary of the death of Eamon de Valera, it is important that we reflect on this giant of modern Irish history and on his great service to our nation and draw inspiration from it.

deValera was a man of valour, intelligence and distinction, with a fervent passion for freedom and democracy. The Banner, is de Valera country, he was first elected in the old East Clare constituency in 1917 and went on to serve the Country for 54 years.

At a time where cynicism about politics is now an everyday reality, we would do well to remember his example and the example of the many other politicians that have served this country and Irish democracy so well.

We are living through one of the most exciting times in Ireland's modern history. It is a time of unprecedented prosperity, peace and opportunity. The potential for progress has never been greater. Independent Ireland is now in full stride and beginning to fulfill the hopes and expectations that all the patriots of the past knew we possessed.

The freedom to plan, decide and implement the policies that are transforming our country today cannot be taken for granted. In this bright new era, we should never forget the sacrifices made for Irish democracy by those who have gone before us and all those who strove to gain for us the independence we enjoy today.

De Valera's political motivation was characterised by a desire to see Ireland chart our own social, economic and political progress. The attainment of full independence in most of Ireland was the major political achievement of de Valera's generation. We owe a particular debt of gratitude to the leaders of struggle for political independence: Eamon de Valera, Michael Collins, Arthur Griffith, Cathal Brugha and many more who fought against overwhelming military odds to establish the Irish people's right to self-determination.

The great tragedy of 20th century Ireland was that fundamental differences of opinion arose over the acceptance of the exact terms of the 1921 settlement. In Ireland, civil war was fought with great reluctance and deeply regretted by almost all the participants. Its legacy created great bitterness and poisoned the political atmosphere for many years.

In considering the struggle for independence, we should honour the achievement of all those who took part. Collins and Eamon de Valera. deValera and Collins, both great men, shared the same goal, an Irish Republic. Their difference was one of means. Their diverging actions were motivated by what each of them considered in the best interests of the country.

The leadership role de Valera played in the aftermath of the Civil War in persuading the majority of republicans to lay down the gun in the knowledge that circumstances had changed and that it was time to move on deserves to be recognised. A 1923 proclamation by de Valera declared that the continuation of the armed struggle provided no way forward, that political methods were now the only means of progress towards national objectives, and that democratic order must prevail. The Provisional IRA's statement at the end of July, if followed by necessary actions, offers a clear sign that this paramilitary organisation have come around to accepting this peaceful analysis.

In office, de Valera inaugurated a great period of constitutional advance culminating in the enactment of a republican constitution. The de Valera era was also a time of great social progress in Irish life. When Fianna Fáil first came to power, the immediate social need was to build up our economy and give work to our people here at home. De Valera did not hesitate to use the full machinery of Government to help create employment. An industrial manufacturing base was created in the 1930s with industrial output increasing by an incredible 44% and the number of people in industrial employment doubling.

It was de Valera's Fianna Fáil that chiefly created the Irish welfare state. At his behest, unemployment assistance, widows' pensions and orphans pensions were introduced to help alleviate appalling poverty. In the late 1950s, it was de Valera's final administration, which laid the foundations for our current economic success by beginning the process of opening Ireland up to foreign investment and embracing industrial modernisation.

As we approach the 90th anniversary of the 1916 Rising, Fianna Fail must take account of who we are as a party and where we have come from. Fianna Fail will remain what it always has been: the Republican Party. But, in seeking to



move forward, we must constantly strive to restate our fundamental belief in policies that can be adapted for the Ireland of today and tomorrow.

Eamon de Valera believed that the whole purpose of politics was to make life better, and more fulfilling for all our people. De Valera wanted to develop our economy with that purpose in mind. This Government has laid the foundations for continued economic prosperity. The best traditions of our party demand that all must share in this new-found wealth and ensure equal opportunities and equal rights for each and every citizen.

Fianna Fáil was founded at a time in our history when the morale of our country was at an all-time low. The rancorous legacy of the Civil War and severe economic hardship were just two discouraging problems. Times have changed and political leadership has enabled us to garner the fruits of independence, so that today no one disputes the value of an Independent Irish State.

Micheál Martin was appointed Minister for Enterprise, Trade and Employment in September 2004 and has previously served as Minister for Health and Children from 2000 to 2004 and Minister for Education from 1997 to 2000.

He was born in Cork in August 1960. He is married to former Fianna Fáil National Youth Officer Mary O'Shea and has four children. A former secondary school teacher, he was elected to Cork Corporation in 1985 and served as Lord Mayor of Cork in 1992-1993. He was first elected to Dáil Eireann in 1989 and indeed at each subsequent election. He is a former National Chairman of Ógra Fianna Fáil.

In 1994, Padraig purchased Aer Arann a small airline serving the Aran Islands and carrying 3,000 passengers per annum.

Since then, Aer Arann has become a world class international regional airline. It is one of the fastest growing regional airlines in Europe with a turnover in excess of €94 million and passenger numbers of just under 1 million for 2004.

In 2002, Padraig was awarded the Irish Entrepreneur of the Year Award. He has judged the World Entrepreneur of the Year awards for the last 2 years.

Padraig O'Ceidigh is a native Irish speaker from An Spideal, Co Galway. A trained accountant, he has also worked as a teacher and solicitor.

These competitions have proved very popular since their reintroductions. The finals held at the last youth conference were very entertaining. Congratulations to the winners of the 2004 competition; Lorcan Price and Steven Nolan of Cumann De Barra NUI Galway. The Individual Public Speaking Competition was won by Caroline Young of Tipperary North Ógra, agus bhuaigh Séin O Muineachain as Cumann Wolfe Tone Coláiste an Tríonóide an comórtas óráid poiblí as Gaeilge.

Two semi-finals recently took place in NUI Galway and Kilkenny. The standard of speakers has been very high and we expect the finals to be entertaining and very hotly contested. The public speaking and comórtas óráid poiblí finals will take place on Friday night of conference with the final of the deValera Cup Debating Competition taking place on Saturday at 6.00pm.

Gobnait O'Connell Memorial Award for Ógra of the year 2005-2006

The presentation of the Gobnait O'Connell Memorial Award for Ógra of the Year 2005 will take place at the Youth Conference Banquet. Previous winners include Donogh O'Malley, Cumann UCC, Clare Ógra and Tipperary North Ógra. The winner will receive the Gobnait O'Connell Perpetual trophy and a cheque for 700Euro for the further development of their Ógra unit.

The shortlist this year consists of reigning champions Tipperary North Ógra CDC, Dun Laoghaire Ógra CDC, Dublin Central Ógra CDC, Clare Ógra CDC and Cumann de Barra N.U.I. Galway. The standard of entries is very high and each finalist has prepared a comprehensive presentation to put before the five-strong judging panel.

The 'Ógra of the Year' is judged under seven headings; Membership, Events & Activities, Election Campaign Activities, Publicity/Media Relations, Policy Developments; Future Plans and a final statement entitled 'Why we are the best Ógra of 2005'. The prize will be awarded to the unit of Ógra which displays enthusiasm, effort and initiative in all of its activities.

The award is dedicated to the memory of Gobnait O'Connell, former Membership Development Officer and Youth Officer of Fianna Fáil. Gobnait was tragically killed in a car accident in September 2000. During her three years in Fianna Fáil Headquarters, Gobnait was a dynamic and enthusiastic force, who worked tirelessly for the Party and in particular gave her wholehearted support and passion to Ógra Fianna Fáil.

Review of Ógra Fianna Fáil 2005

A chairde,

It has been a busy fifteen months since we all last met in Cavan. The following report is a summary of only some of our activities during that time. Ógra has achieved solid progress over the course of an important year of focus on the Fianna Fáil organisation ahead of a General Election. Much credit must go to Ógra officers and members throughout the country for ongoing voluntary commitment to a great national movement. The outgoing National Youth Committee must also be thanked for their work. They have laid the foundations on which Ógra's campaign for that election must now be built. Having strengthened the organisation and focused on issues of concern relevant to young people, we must now consolidate our achievements, fight for and then focus increased resources within Ógra to enable us put our ideas and energy to work, campaigning on the basis of a young persons' manifesto. We must now demonstrate that we have the ability to carry these issues concerning young people into national debate resulting in Government decision and as a result, excite and attract young voters to support Fianna Fáil.

For my own part, it has been an honour to serve as your elected Leas-Cathaoirleach since November 2004, and to have been elected to the proceeding four National Youth Committees. The opportunity to have been involved at all levels of Ógra and the Fianna Fáil party over the past eight years since first joining the Kevin Barry Cumann has gone a long way to satisfy my own desire to contribute and participate in a meaningful way to the progress of our country. To have had the chance to get to know so many great people, so many excellent minds and make so many good friends along the way has been the real bonus.

I know that with your continued commitment to Fianna Fáil and your continuing desire to see republican economic and social progress on this island, Ógra Fianna Fáil can only go from strength to strength. We all look forward to Ógra's next 30 years.

National Youth Conference

The 2004 National Youth Conference took place in the Slieve Russell Hotel, Co. Cavan on November 19th and 20th and was a resoundingly successful weekend. Hosted by Cavan Ógra CDC, the theme of the conference was "Our Nation – Our Community", and much debate was had over diverse issues from overseas aid, to community employment schemes, to same-sex civil partnership. Along with the Taoiseach, Ministers and Oireachtas members, guests included the DUP's Jeffrey Donaldson MP, ensuring that Northern Ireland was a topic high on the conference agenda. Special prominence was given to many of the Ógra Councillors successfully elected for the first time at the Local Elections that summer and Tipperary North were deserving winners of the Gobnait O'Connell Award for Ógra of the Year. Up to five hundred delegates enjoyed a good social weekend also, with lively election campaigns for Leas-Cathaoirleach and other National Youth Committee positions adding to the event.

National Youth Committee

The newly elected National Youth Committee held its first introductory meeting in Dublin in December. This was followed early in the New Year by a weekend-long planning meeting in Killybegs, Co. Donegal, where members also met with Fianna Fáil Honorary Secretary and Minister for Agriculture and Food, Mary Coughlan TD. They also met with representatives from the fishing industry in the town. While the majority of remaining National Youth Committee meetings over the fifteen months were held in Dublin, the committee also met in Ashbourne, Co. Meath and in Ennis, Co. Clare during 2005.

At a regional and local level, National Youth Committee members worked throughout the year to support and assist the ongoing development of Ógra both in constituencies and third-level institutions. A central reporting procedure to collate information on activity throughout the country was put in place by the Committee. Ógra units were also encouraged to work and hold events together. This was to most effect in the Dublin region with a number of Dublin-wide events taking place including a mini soccer tournament, a social night in Bad Bob's, Temple Bar and a table quiz raising some €700 for the charity Suas.

The National Youth Committee also examined its own workings and undertook the process of consulting the membership on both how the party can better assist Ógra in its work and how Ógra can be of even greater benefit to the party. A report and recommendations were forwarded to the General Secretary for consideration and implementation in 2006.

30 Years of Ógra

2005 was the 30th anniversary of the establishment of Ógra Fianna Fáil. The occasion was marked with a number of events during the course of year. Cork was the location for a commemoration in honour of the former Taoiseach and Uachtaráin Fianna Fáil, Jack Lynch who established Ógra in 1975. Ógra members from all over the country, along with local deputies, John Dennehy TD and Dan Wallace TD, gathered on a sunny June Sunday morning at St. Finbarr's to mark the contribution made by Lynch in founding Ógra and giving a distinct voice and platform to young people within the Fianna Fáil party. The main 30th year celebration was held during the Ard Fheis weekend in October. Four

hundred current and past Ógra members packed into the ballroom of the Gleneagle Hotel in Killarney for a banquet where
Taoiseach and Uachtaráin Fianna Fáil, Bertie Ahern TD was
guest of honour. Along with the Taoiseach, and the
Cathaoirleach and Leas-Cathaoirleach of Ógra, the dinner
also heard from Minister for Social and Family Affairs,
Seamus Brennan TD who was the party's youngest ever
General Secretary in 1975 and instrumental in the establishment of Ógra. During the course of the night, a draw also
took place in aid of the charity Aware that works to raise
awareness about and tackle depression, and as a result suicide,
the largest cause of death among young people of Ógra age.
€2,000 was raised for this very worthy cause.

Changing of the Guard

The 30th anniversary banquet also marked the first official national Ógra function for the newly appointed Cathaoirleach of Ógra, Barry Andrews TD. The prominent Dún Laoghaire deputy was appointed to the position following Michael Moynihan TD stepping down from the role at the 2004 National Youth Conference after some seven years at the helm. During that time Deputy Moynihan worked with five different National Youth Committees, three National Youth Officers and two General Secretaries. He oversaw the significant development of a modern Ógra Fianna Fáil. A special presentation was made to Deputy Moynihan on behalf of the membership by Leas-Cathaoirleach Michael Shovlin to mark his immense contribution to Ógra at a function in June.

Summer Forum and Barbeque

June also saw the Ógra Summer Forum and Barbeque take

place in Cork City, the location chosen to mark the city's year as European Capital of Culture. Staying with the European theme, the main speaker at the event was leader of the Fianna Fáil group in the European Parliament, Brian Crowley MEP. Training and advice on policy development and press publicity formed the basis of earlier sessions in the day, where main speakers were Liam Cullen of the Research Office and Jerry O'Connor of the Press Office respectively. A Munster consultative meeting was also arranged for that same day where representatives of each Ógra unit in the Munster region attended. The Ógra Summer Barbeque took place that evening in the Franciscan Well Brewery where there was a good attendance at one of Ógra's annual national social gatherings.

deValera Commemoration

Another, now annual, Ógra event took place on Saturday, September 3rd in Ennis, Co. Clare. Hosted by Clare Ógra CDC, the Eamonn deValera commemoration has established itself as the main annual commemoration of Fianna Fáil's founder. This year's attendance and oration at the large memorial outside Ennis Courthouse by the Taoiseach was in due recognition of this. The occasion was well attended by both Ógra and senior party membership from throughout the country with a large attendance from Co. Clare itself.

Recruitment in the Year of the Organisation

2005 was designated as "Year of the Organisation" within Fianna Fáil. Being a year falling between the Local/European and General election seasons, the focus was on renewing and strengthening the party organisation throughout the country.

The same was the case within Ógra where the National Youth Committee focused on organisation and recruitment. The focus resulted in several constituency Ógraí that had become inactive holding fresh information meetings followed by AGMs and electing new Officer Boards. General attendance at local Ógra meetings and events throughout the country towards the latter half of the year showed significant improvements. This was aided in no small way by record third-level recruitment in September and October. Recruiting just over 2,000 new members in 25 different third-level institutions, cumman officers and National Youth Committee members contributed to our most ambitious recruitment campaign to date under our "Join the 'Party'!" theme.

69ú Ard Fheis

The success of our recruitment was clearly in evidence at the 69ú Ard Fheis on October 21st and 22nd in Killarnev, Co. Kerry. With several hundred Ógra members in attendance, the story of the weekend was the level of interest and involvement of young people in Fianna Fáil. Ógra members participated at all levels over the weekend, from proposing some forty-nine motions on the Ard Fheis Clár, to participating in much of the debate on the floor, and having five candidates in the Committee of Twenty election. The Ógra presence was consolidated with the distribution of a special Ard Fheis edition of Grassroots and a central stand outside the main hall, where members also raised money for the Special Olympics. National Youth Committee members also initiated a petition over the weekend calling for Fianna Fáil to organise on an allisland basis. This became the central theme of the Ógra Fringe Meeting on the Saturday of the Ard Fheis where there was quite heated discussion on the topic with Chairperson of



the Fianna Fáil Northern Ireland Committee, Minister for Foreign Affairs, Dermot Ahern TD.

All-Ireland Organisation

Fianna Fáil organising on an all-island basis was a hot topic for the duration of the year. The Leas-Cathaoirleach and some National Youth Committee members met with members of Fianna Fáil in Derry to see how the issue could be advanced, Ógra held its first exploratory meeting in Queen's University and Ógra members of the Ard Chomhairle continued to raise the issue at that level. The result was some movement by the party towards Ógra's objective. The successful introduction of individual membership has allowed people living in Northern

Ireland the ability to join the party, something not possible in the past and Ógra was successful at the Ard Fheis in committing the party to running a recruitment campaign north of the border in 2006.

Bye-Election Campaigns

The fifteen months was, falling as it did between the Local/European and General Election seasons and with no referendum, due to be a quiet electoral period. The exception to this was the Meath and Kildare bye-election campaigns. Falling as they did on the same day, while Ógra members were active in both, our main focus was on the Meath campaign where Ógra Councillor Shane Cassells was the candidate. Members from all over the country descended on the constituency over the course of the campaign to canvass and attend rallies in the bid to see Cassells take the opposition seat. Despite the enthusiasm and vibrancy of the campaign and the best efforts of Ógra, while polling very well, Cassells was not successful, but his performance demonstrated yet again that good young candidates generate a goodwill that transcends traditional party loyalties and are an asset in any electoral battle.

Young Candidates

The National Youth Committee saw that this very sentiment was successfully endorsed in a practical way. This was achieved by succeeding in having the Ard Fheis direct that one out of every five Fianna Fáil candidates selected to contest the 2009 Local Elections shall be under the age of 30.

Ógra Councillors throughout the country, first elected prior to our last National Youth Conference, have had a very suc-

cessful fifteen months. As well as Cllr. Shane Cassell's by-election campaign, other highlights included: a very successful term by Ireland's youngest Mayor, Cllr. Damien Blake as Mayor of Letterkenny; Cllr. Cathal Crowe becoming the youngest member of the European Committee of the Regions; Cllr. Brían Ó Domhnaill being successfully re-elected to Údaras na Gaeltachta; the selection of recent former National Youth Committee members Cllr. Michael McGrath and Cllr. Siobhan Ambrose among others as General Election candidates; and this is to name but a few achievements. Ógra Councillor Shane O'Reilly was elected to the Committee of Twenty together with three of the other four Ógra candidates, namely Jennifer Allen, Anthony Kelly and Niamh Muldoon. Together with constituency representatives and the directly elected Ógra representatives to the Ard Chomhairle, their election brought to a record 12 the number of Ógra members on the Ard Chomhairle by the end of 2005. Debating Competition

In the run up to the 2006 National Youth Conference, the deValera Cup Debating Competition has again got under way with qualifying rounds in Galway and Kilkenny taking place prior to the conference weekend final. Participants will be competing to follow in the footsteps the 2004 winners, Cumann de Barra's Lorcan Price and Stephen Nolan and the then winners of the Individual Public Speaker Competition

All in all a very busy fifteen months and 30th birthday for Ógra Fianna Fáil.

External Liason Co-ordinator Report

The role of External Liaison Co-ordinator has certainly been a challenging one but one that I have enjoyed. Below is a report of my activities since I took up this position in January 2005.

In March 2005, I met with the Union of Secondary Students (USS). This meeting was very beneficial because very few Ógra members attend secondary schools so there is a danger that Ógra can become out of touch with the issues affecting third level students.

In November 2004, just after the last National Youth Conference, two members of Ógra Fianna Fáil, Cathal Lee and Denis Ryan, were successfully elected to the Board of the National Youth Council of Ireland (NYCI). At the next NYCI conference in November 2005, Cathal Lee was re-elected to the Board while Denis Ryan stood down after four years of representing Ógra on the NYCI.

The Inter-Isles Forum is a forum to which all political parties from the UK and Ireland are invited while the North South Forum invites all parties from the island of Ireland. The purpose of these forums is to discuss and compare our various parties' policies on a different topic at every forum. They also offer Ógra a valuable opportunity to develop contacts with other political parties. Since the last National Youth Conference, three of these forums have taken place in Kilkenny, Belfast and Edinburgh. Ógra has had full delegations at each Forum and our members have consistently done an excellent job as ambassadors for Ógra Fianna Fáil.

In October 2005, I was invited by the youth wing of the Scottish Nationalist Party (SNP) to Aviemore in Scotland a fringe meeting of the SNP Party Conference. I was asked to speak about nationalism in modern Ireland. After my speech, I was asked why Fianna Fáil won't organise on a 32 county basis. Even the Scots are talking about it!

Ógra was invited to China to meet with the youth wing of the CPC. Three representatives from Ógra Fianna Fáil attended the Inaugural Conference for Young Political Leaders in Asia & Europe in Beijing and Tianjin in November '05. The conference offered a great opportunity to develop links and learn from parties all across Europe and Asia.

In my term as External Liaison Co-ordinator, I have had correspondence with the SDLP, the SNP, Plaid Cymru and the UUP. Indeed, representatives from these parties have been invited to attend the National Youth Conference. Hopefully, in the coming term of the National Youth Committee, Ógra will be able to build on these links and forge new ones.



Communications Co-ordinator Report

Getting the message out has always been one of the main difficulties that has faced Ógra over the years. While some news filters down, not enough of the members have traditionally been kept informed of what the rest of the organisation has been getting up to.

Addressing that situation has been the main challenge of the year. For instance while Grassroots, the Ógra Newsletter will shortly mark its second birthday, it had been suggested that not enough members were receiving it. While a number of copies were being distributed to the various cumann secretaries, one of the main problems we faced was that these were not finding their way to the other cumann members in some cases. This has been addressed thanks to the new database system in Fianna Fáil Headquarters which allows us to now send Grassroots out to all the listed individual members. Now far more members are receiving it in directly the post, although if anyone is still missing out they should contact Aidan O'Gorman in Fianna Fáil HQ (email aidan@fiannafail.ie).

The Youth Conference in Ennis will mark the publication of the fourth edition of Grassroots since the last conference, bringing to eight the total editions published since its launch in early 2004. These four most recent issues have included a large number of interesting articles with the various interviews an obvious highlight. Members of Ógra have had the opportunity to have their questions put to An Taoiseach Bertie Ahern TD, Minister for Education and Science Mary Hanafin TD, new Ógra Cathaoirleach Barry Andrews TD and Fianna Fáil General Secretary, Sean Dorgan.

Apart from Grassroots we've also put in place the Ógra E-Zine, which provides thousands of Ógra members with all the latest Ógra news and events. Again if anyone is not receiving this email service but would like to they should contact Aidan. The website has been regularly updated and the discussion forum has grown although there is still a clear need for more Ógra members to contribute. Perhaps the new website will encourage more contributors once it is up and running in the not too distant future.

We've also had a very busy year in terms of press releases issued, with Ógra getting its message into both the national and local media on a number of occasions. However there is still a lot of room for improvement in this area. While some of the local units have also been very successful in securing media coverage for their own units, most still are not issuing press releases or having any real dealings with the local media.

At a national level we also need to be more vocal and really give the media something that catches their imaginations. We need to not just tow the Government line but to have our own voice on issues and to criticise them when necessary. We also need to come up with interesting things to say and that is a challenge that applies to every Ógra member. If you have an idea, share it, otherwise it will never come to fruition.

To conclude I would like to thank a number of people without whom there would have been no communications worth talking about this year. In particular I'd like to thank Aidan O'Gorman and Maeve Donlon from Fianna Fáil HQ. I'd also like to thank Ógra Leas Cathaoirleach Michael Shovlin, Emmet O'Halloran, Colman Byrne and Foresight Communications, all those that have contributed to Grassroots as well as all those in Fianna Fáil HQ and the Fianna Fáil Press and Research Office.

Policy Co-ordinator Report

Since the National Youth Conference in Cavan, Ógra has taken some positive steps in the area of policy formulation. Structural reform facilitated more focus and fewer barriers in terms of how the National Youth Committee devised and implemented policy. The position of a National Policy Co-ordinator that was elected from within the existing the committee was restored and overall the results were positive. Despite some criticism I feel the reform enabled the National Youth Committee to address the area of policy in a far more effective manner.

The process began by encouraging all members of the organisation to get involved in the policy making process, both the volume and quality of ideas dramatically increased. As the largest youth political party in Ireland and more importantly as the most diverse, we were able to draw from a number of sources. During my time in the role, I have received policy papers from a broad spectrum of individuals.

From an agricultural document from an individual in Kerry to a document relating to the regulation of nightclub bouncers from Waterford Ógra the range of issues that were addressed was immense. Proposals on the minimum wage, transport and immigrant integration, automatic voter registration, the proper regulation of property management agencies, broadband penetration and a central grants authority, were also submitted from different units of the organisation.

The National Youth Committee sent over twenty policy motions forward to the Ard Fheis. Press releases issued on these and other topics were successful in getting publicity for Ógra, in particular through local media.

At a time when other Youth Political Groupings were launching "poster campaigns" and passing them off as policy Ógra was busy developing innovative, far-reaching yet simplistic documents that attempted to improve the quality of life for the young people of Ireland. In 2005 alone we proposed the redevelopment of the Western Rail Corridor (addressed by "Transport 21"), called for the raising of the National Minimum Wage by 9% to €7.65 (subsequently adopted by Minister of State for Labour Affairs, Tony Killeen TD) and lobbied the continuity of measures designed at protecting the rights of young farmers (addressed the December budget).

In December 2005, we presented Minister for Finance Brian Cowen TD with our Pre-Budget proposal. This document was aimed at addressing 13 areas of Government, making some 32 proposals, ranging from increased funding for 3rd level education, incentives for a greener environment and measures aimed at tackling underage drinking.

In the past, we have demonstrated that we have a voice Government. However, my philosophy has been that it is useless having a voice if you have nothing to say....in 2005 Ógra once again proved to that our voice is not just heard but it is in fact listened to! We have lobbied almost every Government Minister virtually every issue of importance to young people in Ireland. We have made a difference.

Introduction

The Youth Conference also plays host to elections to the Fianna Fáil National Youth Committee. For many people these elections are the highlight of the conference.

The National Youth Committee is responsible for the overall development and promotion of Ógra. It organises national and regional events. It formulates policy positions based on motions discussed at the conference and on proposals submitted by Ógra units throughout the country. The committee also conducts recruitment campaigns for the Party. The committee meets every four to six weeks. Between meetings committee members keep in touch with Ógra officers in their areas and ensure that everyone is informed of the latest Ógra developments.

The Youth Committee consists of members who are elected to represent a group of Constituencies or 3rd Level Cumainn in a particular area. There are also 5 representatives on the Fianna Fáil Ard Chomhairle (National Executive) representing Dublin, Rest of Leinster, Munster, Connacht\Ulster and 3rd Level Colleges. The most senior elected position in Ógra is that of Leas Cathaoirleach (Vice Chairperson). The holder of this position is also a member for the Fianna Fáil Ard Chomhairle and acts as a spokesperson for Ógra along with the Chairman. Elections for this position are confined to candidates who have previously served one term on the Youth Committee. The Ógra chairperson is a member of the Parliamentary Party appointed by the President of the Party. This system ensures that Ógra has a voice in Parliamentary Party discussions,

All balloting for the Ard Comhairle and National Youth Committee takes place at the National Youth Conference. Each registered constituency Ógra and 3rd Level College Cumann is entitled to twelve voting delegates. At least four of these delegates must be male and four female. The Single Transferable Voting system is used and delegates are asked to vote for their preferred candidates in order of preference. Canvassing for the various positions takes place in the run up to the conference and at the conference itself. Voting will take place from 9.00 to 10.30am on Saturday morning and this year we will have ten different elections. A number of tight elections are anticipated so it promises to add to the excitement of the weekend. All voting delegates are reminded to bring photo identification when going to vote. Counting of votes will take place in the Abbey Suite and the winners will be announced at about 2pm. On the following pages all the candidates have submitted a short profile of themselves.



Standing Orders

PROCEDURES

The ruling of the Cathaoirleach of Ógra Fianna Fáil,or in his absence the Leas Cathaoirleach,on all matters of Youth Conference procedure will be final.

MOTIONS

No motion may be moved which does not appear on the Clár.A motion may be moved only by a delegate from the Third Level Cumann or Ógra Comhairle Dáilcheantair which has submitted it or a similar motion recognised on the Clár.If a qualified speaker does not rise to speak the Cathaoirleach of the workshop will move on to the remaining motions.

TOPICS FOR DISCUSSION

ATopic for Discussion must be raised by a Delegate from the Third Level Cumann or Ógra Comhairle Dáilcheantair which has submitted it or a similar Topic recognised on the Clár. The Cathaoirleach may then accept contributions to the discussion from any Delegate or registered Ógra member at his/her discretion. The Cathaoirleach may accept Proposals additional to those appearing on the Clár if he/she deems them to be relevant to the Topic.Additional Proposals should be written where possible,in clear language and including the name of the proposing Ógra unit. Any additional Proposals accepted by the Cathaoirleach must be clearly stated to the Workshop.A direct negative of a Proposal may be accepted only in the case of Topics for Discussion. The Cathaoirleach will take a vote on each Proposal under the Topic for Discussion at the end of each Topic.

AMENDMENTS

An amendment may be moved only if notice of the proposed amendment has been given in writing to the Cathaoirleach of the workshop and it has been accepted as relevant. An amendment proposing a direct negative to a motion may not be moved.

SPECIAL MOTIONS

An application for the addition of a Special Motion,not appearing on the Clár must be signed by a representative or

representatives of 25% of registered Third Level Cumainn or Ógra C.D.C before the terms of the motion are submitted to the Cathaoirleach. ASpecial Motion must be submitted to Cathaoirleach Ógra Fianna Fáil on the Friday night of Conference before 11.00 pm. If the Special Motion is accepted by the Cathaoirleach, the Cathaoirleach will then inform the Conference that the Special Motion will be tabled at the start of the relevant Conference Workshop. The proposers should be present

and ready to identify themselves when the motion is put. SPEAKERS

Only Delegates, National Youth Committee members and registered Ógra members may speak. The Cathaoirleach of a workshop will announce the time limit for speeches on each motion and Topic at the start of the orkshop. Contributions must not exceed the time limit set by the Cathaoirleach. Speakers may be required to register in advance. In this case only registered speakers will be called to speak. All speakers must take their place in the designated speakerís area at least five minutes before the commencement of the workshop. Delegates must confine their remarks to the specific matter of the workshop ie.the motions in the Clár and specific matters relevant to the particular policy area A speaker must cease speaking at the sounding of the Cathaoirleach 's bell. A speaker must yield to the Cathaoirleach of the workshop at all times and the Cathaoirleach 's decision will be final. POINT OF INFORMATION

A Delegate may offer a Point of Information to a speaker on a motion. The Delegate must be acknowledged by the workshop Cathaoirleach before offering the Point of Information. VOTING

The Cathaoirleach will take a vote on motions in the Clár by way of a show of hands after each Motion. The athaoirleach will take a vote on each Proposal under the Topic for Discussion by way of a show of Delegate Cards at the end of each Topic. In the event of the Cathaoirleach being unable to decide the outcome of any vote, a count will be made by the tellers.
